The information projects supported by The Pew Charitable Trusts (Trusts) included: the polling work of the Pew Research Center and the Pew Global Attitudes Project; the Pew Forum on Religion and Public Life; the Pew Internet & American Life Project; the Pew Hispanic Center; and Stateline.org, a project which tracks and analyzes important trends in the nation's 50 states.

Part IIIb

The Trusts' policy work included grants and initiatives in the following areas: education, environment, national health and human services, and special projects. Within these broader areas, the Trusts supported public education and nonpartisan research on such topics as early childhood education, protecting ocean life, wilderness conservation, foster care, alcohol marketing and youth, alcohol treatment, genetics and public policy, food and agricultural biotechnology, and retirement security.

Part IIIc

The Trusts' support for civic life included grants and initiatives in the following areas: arts and culture, youth civic engagement, and local health and human services. Within these broader areas, the Trusts supported dance, theatre, music, museum exhibitions and visual arts projects in the Philadelphia area; nonpartisan efforts to encourage the civic engagement of young people, including youth voting; and grants for programs designed to help Philadelphia's vulnerable adults, the frail elderly and disadvantaged children.
